



William Preston Middleton Jr. was affectionately known to his family, close friends and business associates, as "Nobby". He was born on July 31, 1931 in Hackensack New Jersey to Louise and William P. Middleton Sr. He was the 4th child born of 5 children. Nobby was a proud graduate of Hackensack High School and a versatile athlete where he played tight end. He was awarded 1st team All-State Honors twice as a member of the New Jersey state championship football team. Nobby also played basketball where he played forward position and was again recognized as "All-State" on the state basketball championship team.

After his graduation from high school in 1950, Nobby attended North Carolina A&T for one year before transferring to Hampton Institute in Hampton, Virginia where he was a member of both the football and basketball teams. While at Hampton, Nobby joined the Reserve Officers Training Corps (R.O.T.C.) Training School and later after graduation, he enlisted in the U.S. Army where he was promoted to the rank of First Lieutenant. He served among the very first African American nuclear operations officers overseeing our nation's nuclear protective force, this during a very tumultuous time in our nation's history.

While at Hampton, Nobby met and later married, Delores M. Wesley. To their union, one son was born, William "Preston" Middleton III.

In 1963, Nobby married the love of his life, Anna Ruth Kanaway. They were blessed with one beautiful daughter, Nicole Anna.

Nobby always had a big heart and his family, friends and community reaped the benefits of his hard work and commitment. Whatever he envisioned to achieve, he always gave it a 100% effort. After moving to Houston, he decided to teach school at Kashmere High School where he did an exemplary job of training young students in the R.O.T.C. for future service in branches of the U.S. military.

Later in 1966, Nobby joined the Lone Star Liquor Corporation, which at the time, was the largest liquor distributor in the southwest. Lone Star sought to maximize their reach into the African American community, while creating socially responsible campaigns focusing on Black History and highlighting renown African American achievers and role models. Nobby helped to revolutionize the way distribution of alcohol, wine and spirits were sold and marketed to the community.

Nobby also had an entrepreneurial spirit. In the summer of 1970, he opened a New York style nightclub in the heart of Third Ward. Nobby's Corner became more than a place to socialize on the weekend, it became a cultural experience where many hosted relevant discussions about political and economic empowerment. Many Later the venue hosted thousands of patrons for wedding receptions, private parties, fundraising events as well as fraternity and sorority events until 2016.


Another landmark entrepreneurial achievement for Nobby was when he became a partner and founding board member of the RMP Development Corporation in 1970 along with Houston City Councilmember and real estate developer Judson Robinson, Attorney John Davis and entrepreneur Hans Peterson. Together they opened the very first African American owned and operated Burger King franchises in the United States. The RMP Development Corporation went on to build three Burger King restaurants, two of which still operate today.

Nobby was very involved in the community and was a proud Life Member of Kappa Alpha Psi Incorporated, NAACP, and served on numerous boards including: the Martin Luther King Jr. Community Center, National Association of Market Developers, H. P. Carter Career Center, Houston Real Estate Association and others. He and his wife Anna were devoted members of St. James Episcopal Church.

On September 5th, Nobby transitioned peacefully to his heavenly home and is now resting with his parents, Louise and William P. Middleton, Sr.; his four siblings, Granville Paris, Margaret Oliver, Edith Ross, and Muriel Johnson; and his loving wife of 56 years, Anna Ruth Middleton.



He leaves to celebrate his life while cherishing special memories his son, William "Preston" Middleton III, his daughter Dr. Nicole Middleton Olney (Darrell); his grandchildren, William P. Middleton IV and Darielle Nicole Oliney; nieces, Donna E. Johnson and Monique Paris; nephew Dr. Matthew V. Johnson and a host of other extended family and friends.
